## Turkey's Visa Liberalisation Scorecard

### Turkey's progress on the visa liberalisation roadmap

On 16 December 2013, the EU and Turkey launched a visa liberalisation process. It is based on a [roadmap](#) listing 72 requirements that Turkey needs to meet in order to qualify for visa-free travel with EU Schengen countries. On 20 October 2014, the European Commission published its [first report](#) assessing whether Turkey complies with the benchmarks, and on 4 March 2016, its second report (in two parts, with a [main report](#) and a more detailed [background report](#)).

In these reports, the Commission looks at the 72 individual benchmarks and uses five formulations to describe progress. We have “translated” them into five grades (from 1 for “benchmark fulfilled” to 5 for “benchmark not fulfilled”) and use three colours to visualise progress: green, yellow and red.

The roadmap legend in detail (the sentences in quotation marks are direct quotes from the Commission reports):

- “Requirement fulfilled”: **grade 1 and green**
- “Almost fulfilled (i.e. only some limited work still needs to be done to entirely fulfil the requirement)”: **grade 2 and green**
- “Fulfilled partially but with good prospects for further progress (i.e. much work still needs to be done, but the results achieved and the work done by the Turkish authorities are substantial, and developments so far are encouraging)” and “Fulfilled only partially but certain progress was observed”: **grade 3 and yellow**
- “Only partially fulfilled (i.e. much work still needs to be done to fulfil the requirements of the benchmark, no particular positive developments to address them were observed):” **grade 4 and red**
- “Requirement not fulfilled (i.e. Turkey is far from meeting this benchmark)”: **grade 5 and red**

## PRIORITIES FOR ACTION (March 2016)

Since October 2014, Turkey has made considerable progress in meeting the 72 requirements for visa-free travel. Turkey now fulfils 37 benchmarks and encouraging work in underway on another 23 benchmarks. However, there are still 12 benchmarks that are not fulfilled at all or which are only partially fulfilled, with no positive developments observed by the Commission.

The 12 “red” benchmarks are those that Turkey should now focus on to qualify for visa-free travel by the end of June 2016, as envisaged under the [EU-Turkey deal reached on 18 March 2016](#).
