Adam Balcer is a specialist on South East Europe in the Central Europe Department of the Centre for Eastern Studies, Poland's most respected institute covering the region. He specializes in issues of nationalism, and geopolitical and security issues, the Black Sea region, Bosnia, Kosovo, Macedonia, Romania, and Turkey. He also co-ordinates the OSW project, "Turkey after the start of EU accession negotiations: foreign policy and domestic politics." He lectures in SE European studies at the Centre for East European Studies at Warsaw University.

Marek Cichocki is the Curriculum Director of the European Centre in Natolin and Editor-in-chief of the magazine "New Europe - Natolin Review" and Curriculum Director of the Centre of International Relations in Warsaw. He is also the publisher and Editor-in-chief of the annual publication "Teologia Polityczna". He has been an adjunct at the Institute of Applied Social Sciences of the University of Warsaw since 2001. His specialization is the history of ideas and political philosophy. Marek Cichocki is the author of many books, essays, articles and dissertations on international relations including "Poland – European Union, halfway" (2002), "Europe Kidnapped" (2004) and "Power and Remembrance." (2006). He was awarded his PhD from The Institute of Philosophy/Polish Academy of Sciences (IFiS PAN) on the basis of his thesis on "Affirmative Conservatism". It discussed the structure of conservative thinking in the tradition of German political philosophy.

She edited "Studio Europe," a 15 minute weekly programme explaining the rights of EU citizens and the impact of European institutions on ordinary citizens. In 20 episodes transmitted in 2006 it covered issues such as gender equality, social inclusion policy, regional and social policy in the EU. "Studio Europa" focused on the background to current events covering covered topics such as air traffic safety, lobbying, corruption and the ban on tobacco from the perspective of EU policy. She studied at the College of Europe at Natolin and at Boston University (journalism). She has also worked at the European Commission in Brussels on communications policies.

He worked as advisor on EU issues to the Polish President, Alexander Kwaśniewski, from 1996-2000. Paweł Świeboda then headed the Office for European Integration in the Chancellery of the President. From 2001-2006 he was Director of the EU Department in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs where he was responsible for EU accession negotiations and subsequently institutional reform in the Union and negotiations on the Financial Perspective.
